ENDURING UNDERSTANDINGS

- A group self-identifying as AlQaeda hailing from the mountains of Afghanistan, launched an attack on civilians in the United States in three different places and many innocent people lost their lives.

ENDURING UNDERSTANDINGS

- A group self-identifying as AlQaeda hailing from the mountains of Afghanistan, launched separate plane hijackings that ended up in different cities, causing the death of almost 3,000 people and the resulting debris from the fallen towers caused lasting health issues in first responders. They launched the attacks in response to America's support of Israel, their involvement in the Persian Gulf War, and the vast presence of the US military in the Middle East. Though 9/11 was not the first attack on the United States, it was a major event that marked an aggressive shift in US domestic and foreign policy, sparking the War on Terror in the Middle East.
- Terrorism is defined differently by different groups of people. The US government defines it as anyone who enacts violence to spread their political ideology. But, usage of the term in the news and media during this time and moving forward seemed to be reserved for people who were Muslim and not other groups of people who were labelled as domestic terrorists by the FBI such as white supremacists, extreme animal rights activists, or anti-abortionists who also used violence to further their cause.
- The US fought the Soviet Union who had invaded Afghanistan in the 1980s by supporting the rebels that stood up against the Russian invaders, including a man named Osama bin Laden and people who later formed the Taliban.
- While Islamophobia and anti-Muslim racism existed long before the 9/11 attacks, this time period marked a stark shift in US policy and state sponsored Islamophobia in the US and abroad. There was immediate backlash against anyone perceived to be Muslim which was either the extreme stereotypical portrayal of Muslims as Arab, bearded, and with a turban, or Muslim women who wore hijabs. Many of the hate crimes committed after 9/11 were also toward people of the Sikh community which displays the deep ignorance of religions that many Americans believed in. Along with individual hate crimes, there was backlash against Muslims on the state level towards Muslims in the United States and abroad. For example, the US government passed the Patriot Act which gave the government full authority to surveil Muslims and infringe on their unalienable rights. Masjids, or Muslim houses of worship were also attacked, surveilled, and/or prevented from being built.
- The US declared a "Global War on Terrorism" that they used to justify invading and attacking Iraq (although they did not have weapons of mass destruction), Afghanistan, and Pakistan. The civilian death toll of this global war on terrorism is estimated to be over 800,000 civilians.
